



Caroline Dechert's Jalapeno Popper Spread

Bake 25 -30 minutes 400 degrees until browned on top

1 pkg (8 oz) cream cheese softened

1/2 cup Mayo

½ cup Monterey Jack cheese (pepper jack for spicier)

½ cup cheddar

1/4 to 1/2 cup canned diced jalapeno peppers

5 to 10 slices of bacon, cooked and crumbled (I use HEB precooked and microwaved)

Blend first 5 ingredients, then spread in ungreased 9 "glass pie pan. Topping choices: Crumbled bacon or top with Parmesan cheese & amp; bread crumbs. Bake at 400 degrees for 25 – 30 minutes until lightly browned. Serve with tortilla chips or strips of red and green peppers. Can be doubled for larger serving. Can be microwaved if time is a problem.

I was inspired by Rick Dentinger's workshop and have been working on 2 paintings that I would never have even tried. We'll see how they turn out. I've made way too many desserts and have gained a few too many pounds. Tootsie and I still deliver the paper to our neighbors on sunny days. We also take walks up the hill (not too far because Tootsie and I get tired).

I have taken some of my old paintings and reworked them with sealing according to robins class. I have found that tearing them after they are painted works fine if I want to make them a different smaller dimension. Then I have sprayed them and mounted them according to her procedure. I have found that if your canvas is 8/10. You need you painting to be 7/9.

I also found some black canvas at hobby lobby to mount them on which works great Then you don't have to paint the canvas When applying them to the canvas i have used a bit more water so I can slide the paper around and get it really centered on the canvas. I love the final look and it gives new life to my recycled paintings that I had in a frame behind glass. It's scary the first time you do it but gets really good results and definitely looks more sale-able. Really enhances the watercolor. Here is an afterwards picture of the painting on the canvas unframed and sealed. I don't have the right size frame to place it in, so just hung on the wall.. I took this picture from an angle so you could see the canvas. I had two that I had done this to and had popped into the floating frames – but they are at the gallery.




Helen Green

I am hanging around late last night watching The Creature from the Blue Lagoon and trying to think of how I might put Laurie's technique into my work. And there he was - staring right at me! This is Albert Finney as Scrooge. I had done this piece in art school about 1978. He was done in India ink on illustration board. I took this photo through the glass so there is some reflection. I'm not taking him out of the frame, he has been hanging around my living room for around 40 years. Might fall apart! What a strange strange world...I am trying to follow Marsha Reeves Jordan River tutorial. But thus far, I am just watching. I had planned to take paintings up to the Fredericksburg Art Guild show, but have not called to find out if it is still happening. So I have started a duck using Laurie's technique. I may have bit off too much. We'll see...







Summer Creativity Challenge
