

Let's Be Transparent

Overlapping objects can be used to suggest depth and transparency. Using a small $1 \frac{1}{2}$ " to 2" lid, trace four overlapping circles. Start by painting the 1st circle a pale light blue and the 3rd circle a pale light yellow. Allow them to dry completely. Next, paint the 2nd circle a pale light red and the 4th circle a pale light blue. Notice how the overlapping portions made a secondary color which causes the circles to appear transparent. Now apply this concept to any subject of your choice. Draw your three or more overlapping objects. Paint them alternately, allowing them to dry before painting over any of the overlapping areas.

KANDI STIMSON



People often ask me when I got my start in art. The quick answer is nine years ago when I first picked up a watercolor brush. But when I reflect back on my life, I go back to kindergarten where I can still recall the creaminess of finger paint as I smeared it across a large sheet of slick paper. I don't know what happened to that abstract masterpiece, but I do have a painting I did in third grade of a deer in a meadow. I can even remember how it delighted my teacher Mrs. Barnett.

As an animal lover, I spent most of my childhood drawing horses and dogs. And in high school, I carved a linoleum block of an Old English Sheepdog for an assignment in a creative arts class. I even took a drawing class in college. I spent my young-adult years working with ceramics, stained-glass and needle arts.

But it was my first watercolor class nine years ago that opened my eyes to the beauty around me and started me on a relentless pursuit of this wild medium. I am still mesmerized by its fluid movement, transparency and endless range of colors.

Along with weekly group classes, I also sought out a variety of learning resources from instructional books to hundreds of hours watching YouTube tutorials. A few years ago, I invested in weekly coaching with professional art masters. It was like drinking from Niagara Falls, but taught me how to really see and critique my work. I wouldn't be at this place in my artistic journey if it weren't for the influence of so many genuine artists.

At the November meeting, Kandi will demonstrate how to frame watercolor without glass.

Barbara Rallo lives in San Angelo, TX. She discovered her love for watercolor while taking a class in college. She is the cofounder of EnPlainAir Texas (Welcome! :: En Plein Air (enpleinairtexas.com)). She is also part of a small group that she paints with every 3rd Monday. She said that her mentor is artist Maggie Hoybach (*www.margarethoybach.com*) from Summerville, South Carolina. They have been traveling to France together to sketch and paint for 25 years. Barbara said that the idea about sketching is that it is such a glorious thing that you can do anywhere, anytime, but you need to do it a lot! Barbara said that her goal is not to teach seriously, but to inspire people to sketch and have fun doing it. Do not take it seriously. Remind yourself each time you goof that it's just practice and you are getting better.



Barbara's Sketching Mantra is "when you see something fantastic that you want to paint, a photo will not do. It cannot get the soul of what you see. Take 5 seconds or 5 minutes and open your sketchbook and put that moment in your sketchbook. It takes that moment to your heart and soul." While at a conference she heard pastel artist Jill Stephanie Wagner say that you should write a love note to yourself about what it was that made you want to paint your subject. Barbara often does that on the page opposite of her sketch. She has memories in her sketchbooks and trip journals. When she goes to France, she takes both old and new sketchbooks with her. To her, those sketchbooks are priceless. The sketch is just the emotion you felt while you were there.

When sketching, she likes to play with composition. She might zoom in on a small part. You can learn about something new looking at those sketches. They will take you right back to that day. Barbara said you need to plan and find a focal point. Decide if it will be square, horizontal, or vertical. Engage your brain and mark your sketchbook page in thirds. It will be easier to enlarge your thumbnail by seeing where the thirds hit on items in your thumbnail. She likes to play with creativity. When you're disappointed with what you are doing change what you are doing and do something different. She said that when you are outside sketching you will never know what is about to happen. She once had a little girl come up to watch her paint. She let the child take a brush and put some yellow in the painting.

watercolor brush, a #3 liner, water container and a small light weight palette when she goes out. She started out using Windsor Newton paints but now also thinks that Daniel Smith and Holbein paints are pretty fabulous. She mentioned specifically Daniel Smith's Putty, Holbein's Lavendar. She made mixtures of Windsor Newton SAP Green with Ultramarine Blue and Undersea Green with Ultramarine Blue. She uses mostly transparent colors. If you use transparent colors, you can add layer upon layer and not get mud. She is not into staining or opaque paints. They don't soften and lift like transparent paints.



Barbara makes a border on the page for her sketch. She puts her wrist on the edge of the page to help her make a straight line. She likes to play with the colors. She reminded us that it's a little sketch and not a finished product. She said several times "it is what it is" as she just went with it. She said even if it is done crudely, your brain tells you what it is. She likes to have a glow of light, leaving some white space and having shadows. She doesn't feel like you need to outline every single step. She brings color and emotion into her sketches, with thicker colors adding a little more life. If she's using ink she works from front to back.



Barbara keeps a collection of sketches that tell a story - gathered from Pinterest and friends. She challenged us to be creative and paint outdoors or in some public place. Her group has painted in a variety of places on location. They have gone outside, in a Gallery, in a Boot Factory, in a Nursery, and in an Antique Shop, just to name a few. They have painted crystal, something white, or just something that moved them. Sketching allows her eye to see things and helps her drawing and her composition to improve. She said to just do it! Barbara's notes are attached.

In Case You Missed Our Last Meeting

SKETCHING DEMO - Guadalupe Watercolor Group

REASONS TO SKETCH: (and/or add color washes!)

- ~ Improve your overall drawing skills
- ~ Improve composition of paintings
- ~ Trip Journal
- ~ Themed Focus on a particular item you'd like to draw better: Flowers, animals, tree shapes, perspective, rocks, etc.
- ~ Play with color mixing which colors are opaque, transparent?
- ~ Try out a new idea or theme play with creativity
- ~ Personalize note cards, or a family memory book
- ~ Record your progress in a certain area, date your sketches
- Value studies or quick study for a larger painting later.
- ~ Simply a way to meet people who walk up while you sketch!

~ Your sketchbook is personal & doesn't have to be shared! It is a learning tool for you to show personal progress, bring back vivid memories, be used later to produce studio paintings.

HOW TO START!

~ Determine why you have chosen this to paint and what is important. <u>Stop & Engage</u> for a moment.

Write yourself a note of why you must paint this! Right there on the opposite page or back side.

~ WHITE PAPER!! Where to begin??

- Play with composition in small thumbnails on opposite page
- Maybe a closeup is your best idea, not the whole world you are looking at – even when using a photo!
- Start with the easiest, largest shapes & values.
- Also measure top to bottom and relationship of those items
- Compare angles & sizes of where this meets that.
- Begin with items in FRONT if using a pen.

TIPS

- \sim Mark your thumbnails in thirds, then mark your sketchbook page
- in thirds to help you proportion it from the thumbnail.
- ~ That will also help you place your center of interest!
- ~ Leave some white spaces, especially around edges.
- ~ Draw a border before or after you are finished.
- ~ Don't draw EVERYTHING leave out details
- ~ Don't outline the whole object or every brick either!!
- \sim Play with color to spice it up just splash a surprise of your
- favorite color somewhere for no reason except to bring a smile. ~ Feel free to exaggerate a bit to enhance or convey a feeling.

HOMEWORK!

~ List areas you'd like to improve in: mine are rocks, figures,

negative painting, value-painting, dogs, birds, etc. ~ purchase one of these sketchbooks or start with one you've had

- on a shelf for years and sketch once a day. In ink perhaps!
- ~ Real life is best but you can learn from photos as well.
- ~ Try quick gesture drawing of all the shapes before you go back and put in detail. Will be better in proportion.
- Try the same scene in vertical, horizontal, square.

SUPPLIES:

- ~ Sketchbooks are a very personal choice. I like these:
- ~ Strathmore Visual Journal, 90lb. Watercolor or Mixed media
- ~ Strathmore Watercolor 400 Series or Canson Montval
- ~ Make your own out of your favorite watercolor paper
- ~ Pens: Faber-Castell PITT or Micron, or Ultra-fine Sharpie
- ~ Plastic palette, travel kit, small plastic cup
- ~ Brushes #8 round & #3 liner are almost all you need!
