

November 2017 DEMO by Marsha Reeves

Marsha Reeves' received a Merchandise Award of Golden QoR Paints at the GWG 24th Annual Judged Show for her painting titled Flatrock Kayakers. She used her background in science to compare the pigments and explore the products.

She tried out the QoR Light Dimensional Ground, Cold Press Ground and the Watercolor Ground. She felt that the paint on the cold press ground disturbs to easily, so she liked the Watercolor Ground the best. She found that putting 3 layers on 300 lb paper and letting it cure for 3 days worked well. She recommended using a brush that you don't love and that won't shed when applying the ground. She used a Simply Simmons brush. Also, she

found the paper less likely to warp after the ground was applied. The ground can be used to correct a painting and to bring it back to white. She does not recommend using Gesso because the colors look dead and it is hard to build up darks.

She compared pigments of QoR with Winsor Newton & Da Vinci paints. The QoR paints have a Polymer Binding instead of the Gum Arabic that is used in most watercolors. This polymer can be rewet. The QoR pigments are very finely ground to get them in the polymer. The paints are "liquidy," staying juicy for a good amount of time. They are very transparent, not really showing brush strokes. She found the QoR Viridian PG 18 and Da Vinci Viridian PG 18 to be comparable as were the Winsor Newton Winsor Violet PV 13 and the QoR Dioxazine Purple PV 13. She found the QoR paints to be lightfast. Despite the fact that QoR's Quinacridone Magenta and Holbein's Bright Violet look similar, Holbein's Bright Purple was not lightfast and faded when left in the sunlight. QoR's Quinacridone Magenta did not fade. She told us that the Dick Blick website has the most information about pigments if you click on the number by the name.













She painted tulips from her yard. She painted on paper that she salvaged with Watercolor Ground. She tries to do a series of three or four 8" X 10" paintings before doing the larger painting. This allows her to play with the colors. She applied her paint to the bone-dry paper. She used Quinacridone Magenta and Alizarin Crimson on the tulips, allowing them to bleed into each other. She "squirkled" the colors around with her brush. She used Sap Green and Green Gold for the leaves. She felt they were more natural looking greens. She added Nickle Azzo Yellow and Viridian. She likes how the QoR Viridian seems to mix better than other brands. She built up the darks in her background gradually, using Alizarin Crimson, Viridian and Ultramarine Blue. She used Caran D'Ache Neocolor II Water Soluble Crayons by Caran D'Ache. They can be used to draw with like a regular wax crayon, can be applied dry to paper, then wet with a brush and "painted," or can be applied to wet paper. She uses them to either cover pencil or tracing paper marks, or as color accent applied on top of a dry watercolor painting.
